The Independent Child Trafficking Guardianship (ICTG) Service - set out in Section 48 of the Modern Slavery Act 2015

2017 - Pilot areas

2019 - Review of the Modern Slavery Act

2021 - ICTG Service rolled out further across the UK - now operates in 2/3 UK LA area's



ICTG Support

Direct Support

- Face to face and virtual
- Without adult with parental responsibility in UK
- Working to ensure the child is protected from further harm,
 preventing repeat victimisation, retrafficking or going missing and promoting the child's recovery.

Indirect Support

- Part of professional group around the child
 - With adult with parental responsibility in UK
- Providing specialist advice and guidance to professionals to reduce risk and prevent re-trafficking





ICTG Direct Support

- Direct, face to face support
- Ensuring the child is protected from further harm, preventing possible repeat victimisation, re-trafficking or going missing and promoting the child's recovery

ICTG Indirect Support

- Indirect support professionals around the child
- Providing advice and guidance to professionals to reduce risk and prevent re-trafficking

Section 48 : Independent Child Trafficking Guardians

Support children with indicators of trafficking—no NRM needed for referral

Promote the child's well-being and act in the child's best interests.

Work alongside other partners to safeguard and disrupt

ICTG service can support children directly and professionals, indirectly to advise and signpost

Referral to ICTG service
"as soon as reasonably
practicable" where there
are indicators of
trafficking

Public authorities must "pay due regard" to the ICTG role and share all relevant information to enable them to carry out their role



What is the National Referral Mechanism (NRM)?

Framework for the identification and mapping of potential victims which informs the strategic response

Triggers a modern slavery criminal investigation

UK's official statistics and data recording system

Gateway / Access to support

Duty to notify

Consent



What is the Single Competent Authority (SCA)?

Responsible for all child NRM decisions

Serious and Organised Crime Directorate of the Home Office

Devolved NRM decision making pilots



Safeguarding Children and NRM

NRM sits alongside existing child safeguarding procedures – it does not replace them

An NRM referral alone will not safeguard a child – it is not meant to

Potentially trafficked child identified



Child is safeguarded



NRM referral submitted

Referral to Independent Child Trafficking Guardian Service









Figure 5: Number of NRM referrals reporting exploitation in UK counties


If you're a first responder working for a <u>designated organisation</u> like the police, you can use this service to:

- refer potential victims of any age to the National Referral Mechanism
- help potential victims receive support and medical care
- notify the Home Office of potential victims (Duty to Notify)

If you do not do anything for 60 minutes while using this service, we will sign you out to keep your information secure. You will lose any unsaved progress.

You can save your progress for up to a month.

You'll need to give your email address to securely access the service.

You can still report modern slavery as a member of the public. Call the modern slavery helpline on 0800 0121 700 or report it online.








Issues Affecting Decision Making













 Provide a professional view and why you are submitting the referral/additional information



 Highlighting which elements represent the relevant components of modern slavery makes technical decision making easier



Human Trafficking vs Slavery, Servitude, Forced/Compulsory Labour





How Does NRM Help the Child?



Recognises the child as a victim rather than an offender which helps us work in a more child centred way

Triggers a police investigation into modern slavery offences

Supports police to consider trafficking offences and disruption measures

Triggers a multi-agency safeguarding approach via mapping and disruption plans

Section 45 defence

Supports evidence led prosecutions

Can support young people in criminal justice system

Can support asylum claims

Submitting an NRM referral fulfils the 'Duty to Notify' (S.52)

Evidences the scale of the problem in the UK



NRM - Useful Reminders

Negative decisions can be challenged

Once 18 years of age, signed consent required from them to remain in NRM process

Consider the language you use — is it placing blame on the child?

Very important to record all information about the NRM on a child's records

You can contact SCA for an update on the progress of an NRM referral or to submit additional information

Public authority First Responders have a statutory obligation to refer to the NRM where modern slavery is suspected


